The Tony Award-winning revival, which includes the songs We're in the Money and Lullaby of Broadway, tells the story of a young chorus girl who gets a shot at the big time when the leading lady gets injured. The original London production, which opened in 1984, went on to star a then little-known Catherine Zeta-Jones.

The current production features singer Sheena Easton, 57, whose hits include 1980's *Modern Girl*, as the injured leading lady.

Making her West End debut, the two-time Grammy Award-winner said: "It was such an honour to have the Duchess in the audience. We didn't feel any more pressure – we were just excited she was here...

"She came backstage and was so encouraging and complimented us on how wonderful she thought the show was. It's one of the best shows around and a wonderful role for a woman my age."

## STREET APPEAL

The Duchess was making her appearance in support of the East Anglia's Children's Hospices. Kate is patron of the charity, which is raising funds for a new purposebuilt hospice, to be called The Nook, in Norfolk, where the Duke and Duchess have their country home, Anmer Hall. Launched in 2014, the appeal is halfway to its

£10million target.

Lord Grade and co-producer Michael Linnet have allowed the charity to appeal

for funds in the show's programme. One generous donor has already pledged £250,000.

Shortly after arriving at the theatre, the Duchess was presented with a programme by hospice user Ollie Duell, 12, who said before meeting her. "She's very pretty and I want to talk to her about the hospice and how I like going there. Ialso want to tell her about Pokémon."

Kate asked Ollie, who has a complex stomach condition, what he likes about the hospice and whether he had been to the theatre before.

"I said the hospice was fun and that I'd never been [to the theatre] before so I was excited," said Ollie.

Following the all-singing, all-dancing extravaganza, the Duchess was invited on stage, where she was presented with a pair of gold tap shoes by the show's author and director Mark Bramble, who told her: "On behalf of everyone here at 42nd Street, the cast, the orchestrathe crew, the wig department, the clothes department – you have no idea – but we would like to honour you with these tap shoes and we promise to support the Nook appeal."

One theatre-goer later told **HELLO!**: "Kate seemed to be having so much fun. She looked so happy, like she was really enjoying herself."

Other famous faces enjoying the fun were actor Morgan Freeman, actresses Sue Johnston and Bonnie Langford, Sir Andy Murray's mum Judy, Strictly Come Dancing dancers Neil and Katya Jones and choreographer Arlene Phillips.
